Eligible applicants: Forty teachers grades 5-12 teaching in any of 19 western counties of Washington* who did <u>not</u> participate in a prior Judicial Institute.

Dates and times: Program starts at 8 a.m. on July 25 and ends on July 27 at 3 p.m. A group dinner is scheduled for Wednesday, July 26, 2023.

Clock hours: 22 clock hours available from Seattle University School of Law at no cost to teachers.

Cost: **No registration fee**, breakfasts and lunches provided on July 25-27, group dinner provided on July 26, parking is provided, and double occupancy hotel rooms provided for the nights of July 24, 25, and 26. If single occupancy is required, teachers are required to pay the additional cost for half of the room plus taxes and fees (subject to availability).
